A Reflection on 39 Years of Preaching

A Look Back and a Look Ahead Hebrews 5:13-14

I've been preaching for almost thirty-nine years, difficult for a man only thirty-seven. I've learned a certain amount over the years, a fair bit from my own mistakes. I'm indebted to many people for helping me discover God's truths. Without their help, I doubt I would still be preaching.

The Dangers of Human Innovations

- o Those in the church attracted me by their desire to have the Bible as their only standard.
- Unfortunately, our ideals have many times led to divisions, human priorities and partisan politics.
- We must keep our eyes on the Christ (Col. 3:1-3)

The Need for a Congregation-wide Effort

- We have no authority for a clergy system (I Pet. 2:9)
- o All are to be equipped for the work of service (Eph. 4:12)
- o Every member is to contribute (Eph. 4:16; I Cor. 12:12-27)

A Family Style Rather than Corporate Style

- Cultural models come and go, but the basic nature of family remains
- Not rank, but service (Matt. 20:20-28)
- Love prevailing (Jn. 13:34-35)
- o Brothers and sisters (Matt. 12:46-50)

We humans are notorious for messing up good things. Unfortunately, this also happens in the Lord's church. If we can remember to center everything on Jesus, each do our fair share, and all live together as family, the cause of Christ will prosper—and so will we!
