Speak a Good Word for Jesus - Affirmation Evangelism

Introduction:

- 1. The Epistles present a puzzling situation.
- 2. They say very little about personal evangelism.
- 3. How do we account for this?
 - I. The Puzzling Epistles
 - A. Paul was very effective as an evangelist.
 - 1. He established and strengthened many churches.
 - 2. However, he has little to say about teaching others (II Tim. 2:2 a rare exception).
 - B. There is, however, an area of emphasis that is found in all of Paul's writings, the emphasis of Christlike living.
 - 1. Titus 2:3-10
 - 2. Philippians 1:27; 2:5
 - 3. Ephesians 4:11-16
 - 4. Colossians 3:16; Ephesians 5:18
 - 5. Romans 8:9, 29; 4:8
 - 6. Ephesians 3:16-17
 - 7. I Corinthians 2:16; II Corinthians 3:18
 - 8. Galatians 2:20; 4:19
 - II. The Nature of Affirmation Evangelism
 - A. Evangelism is not just an activity; it is a way of living.
 - 1. Matthew 28:18-20
 - 2. II Corinthians 5:14-15
 - B. A natural approach is God's desired approach
 - 1. I Peter 3:15
 - 2. I John 1:7
 - C. Jesus used this "method."
 - 1. John 3:1-15
 - 2. John 4:3-42
 - D. We must be careful that we do not become unbiblical in our strategies for evangelism.
 - 1. We must reflect on what God is demonstrating to us in the Bible about evangelism.
 - 2. Only God's methods will accomplish God's purpose.

III. Affirmation in the Church

- A. The church must remember that Israel, God's Old Covenant people, turned what should have been beautiful into something ugly (Rom. 2:24).
- B. God has entrusted the church with the gospel.
 - 1. First, however, the church must become something (Eph. 4:15-16; I Pet.

- 2:9, 12; Matt. 5:14-16).
- 2. We must not spread the truth in a way that does not come from transformed hearts.
- C. The church is an outpost of heaven.
 - 1. Worldly ways have taken people far from God.
 - 2. A picture of what is good is much needed.
- D. God's people are to model the values of the kingdom.
 - 1. 1. For 2000 years the pendulum has swung between isolation and compromise in the way the church has reacted toward the world.
 - 2. We must not remove our influence from the world (Matt. 5:16).
 - 3. We must not compromise and therefore join the world (John 17:15).
 - 4. Jesus combined a radical separation from sin with a radical association with sinners that made the kind of difference God was interested in attaining.
 - 5. Our generation could be the most productive in history (Eph. 3:20-21).
 - 6. The Karns congregation could become the most productive in history.

Conclusions:

- 1. Christlikeness will bring success in all that we do.
- 2. The most capable personal workers are those who are living lives of dedication to Christ.
